



Location 1: Magnet Kitchens: Vintage kitchen with a fridge, butter cooler, kitchen scales, cream maker, juicer, egg holder, mincer and a copy of Mrs Beeton's Book of Household Management

Questions

Kids: Where did you keep food cool before the invention of fridges? **A: The Larder**

Adults: What would you put in a butter churn to make the butter? **A: Cream (or you *can* make with FULL CREAM milk but you have to skim the cream first so not recommended)**

Location 2: Whyteleafe Bar and Grill: Illustration of possible redevelopment of Croydon Rd.

Questions

Kids: Which day of the week was the Children's Film Club? **A: Saturday**

Adults: The pub across the road has remained, but the name has changed – what is its current name? **A: The William Garland (was The Old Surrey Hounds)**

Location 3: Caterham Digital and Post Office: A Post Office moneybox

Questions

Kids: Which city were these moneyboxes made in? **A: Birmingham**

Adults: This box commemorates the Silver Jubilee of King George V in 1935. Who succeeded George V as King, but was never crowned? **A: Edward VIII, later Duke of Windsor**

Location 4: Shard Solutions: A Stained glass window from Tatsfield

Questions

Kids: How many of these stained-glass panels were rescued? **A: 3**

Adults: Can you identify what's in the middle of this window? (Clue: it doesn't come from acorns). **A: a fig tree, with figs**

Location 5: Paula's: A Home Guard tunic, steel helmet and gas mask, WW2. Has been closed.

Questions

Kids: What did the Home Guard used to be called? **A: The Local Defence Volunteers or LDV, or would allow 'Dad's Army'.**

Adults: On what date was victory declared in Europe? **A: VE day was 8th May 1945**



Location 6: Dabners: Tudor roof tile, impressed with a paw print.

Questions:

Kids: Can you guess which is the fastest dog on earth? Clue Henry 8th owned some. **A: Greyhounds**

Adults: Who was the last Tudor monarch (d. 1603)? **A: Queen Elizabeth I**

Location 7 : Bow Butterfly : Manicure set and Ladies Dressing Table items.

Questions

Kids – How did Victorian ladies create ringlets in their hair? **A: Curling tongs**

Adults – What poisonous substance is used today on women's faces, to smooth out lines? **A: Botox**

Location 8: C&B by Sharlene: Willcox & Gibbs Treadle Sewing Machine

Questions

Kids: What was used to power this sewing machine? **A: Your foot or feet, or would allow 'treadle'**

Adults: Can you name another famous sewing machine brand? **A: Singer is the most well known, but other answers could be Jones, Brother, or possibly Janome, Bernina or Pfaff.**

Location 9: JJ Browne and Son, Jewellers: A vintage ring

Questions

Kids: Which stone appears **twice** in the ring? **A: Ruby**

Adults: Which stone is used in ALL the common acrostic rings? **A: Emerald**

Location 10: Brickstop: Hilary Page's Kiddicraft clock

Questions

Kids: What country is LEGO from? **A: Denmark**

Adults: What number would be found under the yellow '8' disc of the Kiddiclock? **A: 40**



Location 11: Crown and Pepper : Vintage pub and bar items. Closed in mornings.

Questions

Kids: What was the name of pewter drinking vessels with lids? **A: Tankards**

Adult: Which famous military establishment, opened in Caterham in 1877, made soldiers a common sight in the town's pubs for over a century? **A: The Guards' Depot or The Barracks**

Location 12: Craft Stationers: Vintage writing implements and an example of calligraphy.

Questions

Kids: What are quill pens made from? **A: Bird feathers**

Adults: Papyrus was made from the pithy core of a sedge plant that grew on the banks of the Nile. What is parchment made from? **A: Animal skins or hide**

Location 13: Right at Home: Items for domestic servants. Irons, a vacuum cleaner, and a Victorian apron

Questions

Kids: What was the Victorian cast-iron oven called? **A: A Range.**

Adults: When did Queen Victoria ascend to the throne? **A: 1837 (although coronation was in 1838)**

Location 14: Clarks Shoes : School uniform for Eothen School

Questions

Kids: What sport is this pupil about to play? **A: Lacrosse**

Adults: Can you name a famous piece of music composed by Gustav Holst? **A: The Planets. Lesser-known works include the St Paul's Suite, The Perfect Fool and at the Boar's Head (operas)**

Location 15: Hannah's : Victorian dress.

Questions

Kids: What would you wear underneath the tiny jacket? (Clue: it would have been very tight and uncomfortable!). **A: Corsets**

Adults: Dark colours, especially black, were fashionable during the later Victorian period, inspired by the Queen, who dressed in this from the early 1860s. What event in 1861 prompted her wardrobe change? **A: The death of her husband, Albert the Prince Consort**



Location 16: Easy Life : Invalid feeding bottle, bone marrow food, bath thermometer and a walking stick.

Questions

Kids: What was the bath thermometer made of so that it could float? **A: Wood**

Adults: Bovril is sold in distinctive brown bulbous jars – what product is sold in similar jars? **A: Marmite**

Location 17 : Sussex Beds : Bed warmers

Questions

Kids: What replaced copper bed warmers in the 19th century? **A: Pottery hot water bottles**

Adults: What did the poor use to stuff their mattresses in Victorian times? **A: Straw or chaff, or possibly flock (waste wool or cotton). Only the wealthy could afford goose down or horse hair.**

Location 18: Floral Gallery: Book of pressed flowers, collected in Caterham Valley in 1891

Kids: Where did *Oshibana* originate? **A: In Japan**

Adults: In the Victorian ‘language of flowers’, what did a red rose traditionally signify? **A: Love**

Location 19: Hamptons Estate Agents : Sale brochure for ‘Clareville’, Caterham

Kids: What is a fernery? **A: a special greenhouse for ferns**

Adults: When Clare House was redeveloped, the estate was called ‘The Clares’. The adjoining school site was also redeveloped at the same time. What is this estate now known as? (Ask a long-time local if you’re stuck!) **A: Eothen Close**

Location 20: Caterham Library : Booklet covering the history of Surrey – part 35 ‘Tandridge’

Questions

Kids: How much did this book cost when it was first published? **A: Ten shillings and sixpence/53p/equivalent to £29**

Adults: Which jubilee did Queen Elizabeth celebrate in 2012? **A: Sixty years or Diamond**
